

1 4 Marks Questions (Half Page)

Structure:

1. Body attack – Straight to the point, no intro.
2. Example – Give 1–2 small examples if possible (practical or textbook).
3. Section – Mention relevant section (if applicable).
4. Underline – Highlight keywords.
5. Length – About ½ page.

Topper's Tips:

Avoid long intros; the examiner already knows the question.

Write in points, not in a paragraph – easier to check.

Even for 4 marks, mentioning the exact section number shows command over law & standards.

If no section, mention the Act name or SM keyword to show textbook linkage.

2 5–6 Marks Questions (75% of Page)

Structure:

1. Keyword – Write the term/concept clearly in the first line.
2. Explain (1–2 lines) – Brief meaning/definition.
3. Body + Act – Main content, in bullet points.
4. Section – If applicable.
5. Underline must – Highlight every technical term.
6. Keyword of SM – Use Study Material terminology exactly.

Topper's Tips:

Link law with logic – don't just reproduce text; connect it to reasoning.

Keep point format with headings (bold or underlined).

Flow should be Definition → Explanation → Points → Example → Conclusion.

Avoid too much story – examiners reward crisp but complete answers

Structure:

1. Explain (1–2 lines) – Directly start with meaning/purpose.
2. Block Headings – Same as in Study Material; copy the exact heading.
3. Section – Write it early in the answer (shows accuracy).
4. Case Reference – If applicable, write the case name in CAPITALS.
5. Underline Important Points – Key phrases, section numbers, case names.
6. Length – About 1 page.

Topper's Tips:

- Case law is the gold mine – even a short mention fetches 0.5–1 extra mark.
- Presentation matters more here – clear headings, spacing, and neatness.
- If SM has illustrations/examples, rewrite them in your own words.
- End with a mini-conclusion – 1 line that restates the main idea.

💎 Extra Topper Hacks to Score More

- First line matters – Write the direct definition or core idea first; it sets the tone.
- Use diagrams/tables if the question allows (especially in law & costing).
- Underline while writing – don't leave it for the end; saves time.
- Stick to SM & RTP language – examiners love familiar wording.
- Leave margins on both sides for neatness & possible extra points.
- Write section/case in a different color pen (if allowed) to make it stand out.
- Attempt all questions – even a half-correct answer can give 1–2 marks.
