

- ◆ Overview of Today's Topic

Explanation of how to present case studies in exams for maximum marks.

Keep answers short, clear, and focused (video duration approx. 5–6 mins with only important points).

- ◆ Call to Action

Always engage with mentors/teachers – ask doubts, give suggestions, and note feedback.

Practice writing answers daily in exam format.

- ◆ Types of Case Study Questions (As per ICI Classification)

1. 2–3 mark questions – very short and direct.

2. 4–7 mark questions – require structured explanation.

3. Special type questions – tricky and often with multiple parts.

- ◆ Handling 2–3 Mark Case Study Questions

- ✓ Write the law and provisions directly.
- ✗ Do not write sections if you don't remember (no marks deducted).
- ✓ Start with: "According to the relevant provisions of the Act..."
- ✓ Leave a line, then write a clear conclusion.
- ✓ Use party names in the conclusion to separate it from the law section.

Topper Tip:

👉 Examiner wants accuracy + conclusion here, not lengthy writing. Finish in 3–4 lines.

- ◆ Handling 4–7 Mark Case Study Questions

- ✓ Quote the law and underline keywords.
- ✓ If you remember sections, write them; else use: "in light of relevant provisions".
- ✓ Write "Facts of the Case" as a heading and then list facts.
- ✓ Write conclusion only after facts.
- ✓ Part marking is available, especially in law section.

Topper Tip:

👉 Structure is everything: Law → Facts → Application → Conclusion.
👉 Use headings to make your answer neat.

- ◆ Special Type of Case Study Questions

⚠ These are confusing despite previous appearances in exams.

Often multiple parts (e.g., Jan 2025 exam).

Identify the question type → Write answer on top → Underline it.

Skip unnecessary facts/conclusions.

Write reasoning + law together.

Example: Valid contract question with brief reasoning (no story-telling).

Topper Tip:

👉 Treat these as "concept checkers." Don't waste time – be precise.

- ♦ Common Mistakes to Avoid

- ✗ Writing unnecessary facts/conclusions in special type questions.
- ⚠ Risk of losing marks if answers are unclear or unrelated.
- ✓ Stick to direct, clear answers with reasoning format.

Topper Tip:

- 👉 Don't try to "fill pages." Quality > Quantity.
